Hopsewee Plantation

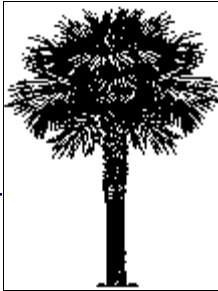


This plantation was constructed from 1735 to 1740. This home is the only remaining birthplace of a South Carolina signer of the Declaration of Independence. The home overlooks the North Santee River and the rice fields. The home is built of black cypress. Two original slave cabins and a

smokehouse remain with the original home. The slave cabins were used as living quarters by slaves and their descendants until the late 1940s. The tea room at Hopsewee is going to be featured in the February issue of Charleston magazine. It is listed in the top 3 tea rooms in South Carolina.

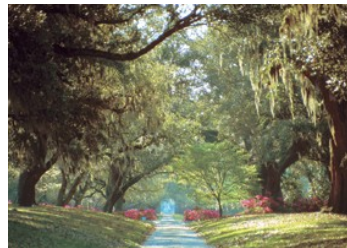


The state tree is the palmetto
